



ABOUT THE SPEAKER:


Dr. Hans Köchler holds the chair of Political Philosophy and Philosophical Anthropology at the University of Innsbruck (Austria) and is Visiting Professor at the Polytechnic University of the Philippines (Manila). He is Founder and President of the International Progress Organization (I.P.O.), an international NGO in consultative

status with the United Nations.

Köchler is author or editor of more than 400 articles and books in over a dozen languages, including Cultural Self-comprehension of Nations; The New International Economic Order: Philosophical and Socio-cultural Implications; Democracy and the International Rule of Law; Global Justice or Global Revenge?; Civilizations: Conflict or Dialogue?; Globality versus Democracy? The Changing Nature of International Relations in the Era of Globalization; Philosophie – Recht – Politik (Philosophy Law Politics); World Order: Vision and Reality. He is also a member of the Editorial Board of the international academic journal Hekmat va Falsafeh (Wisdom and Philosophy) (Tehran) and of the Indian Journal of Politics (New Delhi).

Köchler has been the organizer of numerous conferences and expert meetings in the field of international relations, in particular on intercultural co-operation and the dialogue among civilizations, and is member of the International Co-ordinating Committee of the World Public Forum "Dialogue of Civilizations" (Moscow-Vienna). In March 1974, he gave the first lecture – at Jordan's Royal Scientific Society in Amman – outlining his theory of inter-cultural dialogue; in the same year, he organized an international conference in Innsbruck (Austria) on "The Cultural Self-comprehension of Nations" (July 1974). Köchler is the recipient of numerous honours and awards such as the doctor degree sub auspiciis praesidentis rei publicae ("under the auspices of the President of the Republic" / Austria); a doctor degree honoris causa from Mindanao State University (Philippines); an honorary professorship of Pamukkale University (Turkey); the badge of honour of the Austrian College Society; the award "Apostle of International Understanding" (India); the Honorary Medal of the International Peace Bureau (Geneva); and the Grand Medal of David the Invincible (Armenian Academy of Philosophy).

ABSTRACT

The Dialogue Panel Session will engage representatives from academia, business, and civil society & policy making. The aim of the session is to present and explore challenging questions about the significance of climate change for our self-understanding as citizens and moral agents.

How do we think about climate change? Does Academia, especially the Humanities, have a special responsibility for addressing climate change? Does Business have a special role to play for environmental responsibility? Is Civil Society addressing its cross border responsibility?

Panelist will respond to the challenge of responsibility and search for answers in a dialogue format.

The Dialogue Panel Session in part 2 of the Opening Session also functions as the last in a series of nine 'dialogue meetings/dialogmøder' that have been held in Aarhus during 2009, in the course of the so-called Dialog09 program; the session is thus to create an interface between the city and the university.

ABOUT THE MODERATOR

Hans-Henrik Holm, Professor of World Politics at the Danish School of Media and Journalism, is an international relations scholar with books on world order, globalization and on journalism. Head of the Board, Aarhus University Center for Journalism. He holds a Jean Monnet Chair in International Journalism.
